CACTUS & SUCCULENT BED UPDATE

Take a short jaunt with me back to the board meeting in July. At that meeting the club okayed Joyce to find and purchase a few larger specimens for the cactus and succulent bed at the Will Roger's Garden Center.



Now we move forward in time to the August newsletter where an update on that bed was done. If you don't remember (even I had to go and look it up) then here's a [link to that newsletter](#) (page 7) and I definitely encourage you to peruse the [website](#). Robert did a huge part of laying the groundwork by handling the dirt work and rock positioning. Matt & Wil helped in August with the planting and top dressing.

A short bit ago the plants that Joyce found had arrived. Robert, Matt and Wil planted up a giant 6 ft. Yucca rostrata, tied it off to help the roots settle in. There are two other very mature yuccas that were also potted up for overwintering. They will be going into next years expansions for the bed.

Wil however forgot to take pictures that day since it was a thousand degrees outside but I finally got some updated pictures for you this past weekend. Everything's looking great!

Program began about 7:10pm (late start due to technical difficulties). Jay Ross, Horticulture Curator at the Tulsa Zoo, presented a talk on "green roofs". The Tulsa Zoo has installed a large green roof on the Rhino Barn, as well as a smaller green roof located elsewhere on the zoo grounds. Jay has also put in a green roof in his home garden. His presentation included discussing the benefits of a green roof, how to install a green roof, plants used, and things to consider when putting in a green roof, such as ease of access and providing sufficient support to carry the weight. He shared that he puts down a water-proof liner, padding fabric, drainage tiles, another layer of padding fabric, and then the growing medium. Plants used include sedums, sempervivums, talinum, and native grasses/perennials; plants chosen should be able to handle extreme heat/cold/winds. Jay noted that sedums have performed particularly well (for the most part). Thank you Jay for coming & sharing your knowledge with us!

Business meeting called to order at 8pm with 20 people present, including 3 guests. July meeting minutes were approved as printed in the August newsletter.

As Gayle was ill and unable to attend, Peggy Anglin shared the Treasurer's Report:

Club bank balance: \$14,014.78.

Amount spent on September club picnic: \$1666.53.

Club profit from show/sale: \$9,845.87 after total sales of over \$41,000.

Currently we have 44 paid club members.

Joyce shared about attending the Garden Club Council Meeting on September 14th during which they made "seed envelopes" to hold collected seed. The up-dated Garden Council books were also distributed with information about all the OKC garden clubs.

Joyce, Robert, & Wil made a trip to Coyle, OK, to pick up a load of donated plants, including some cold hardy cacti. The couple donating the plants also let us choose decorative rock from their collection; several of the donated cacti and rocks will be used in the cold-hardy cactus & succulent bed.

On Sunday October 21st, Joyce, Robert, & Matt will meet at Will Rogers Park so we can go to Yukon to pick a load of donated plants. Anyone willing to help, feel free to join us!

We will be planning some work-days at Will Rogers so we can address some problems in the conservatory; there are a few plants that need to be removed, and there are some empty spots that need plants. We also have a few large cacti in the Will Rogers greenhouse that need to be re-potted; this will require some strong backs & thick gloves! Scheduled work-days will be announced once they have been scheduled.

Matt, Club Librarian, reports we have received the latest issue of the Cactus & Succulent Journal; he stated it included an article on cold-hard plants.

Wil continues to do a great job with the newsletter; he requests that we be sure to respond to his emails. Also, Wil has been permitted to take the club laptop home so he can "clean it up" & try to make it easier to use for programs/presentations; he has been asked to come up with some easy to follow guidelines on using the laptop & connecting it to the flat screen in the meeting room for programs.

Election of club officers will be held at the November meeting. So far, nominees include: Joyce for president; Roberta for vice-president, Robert for secretary, and Gayle for treasurer. Any club member interested in volunteering for any of these positions should contact Joyce so your name can be included in the election process at the November meeting.

A Board Meeting will be scheduled soon; once the day/time/place has been decided, it will be announced to club members; all club members are welcomed/encouraged to attend Board Meetings & provide input regarding up-coming activities.
